# Who are parents/caregivers in Higher Ed?


- 3.8 million college students are parenting
- 70% mothers (most single)
- 22% undergraduates are parents
  - majority in community colleges
- More likely to be students of color
- Nearly 2x the student loan debt
- Despite challenges, college student parents tend to achieve higher GPAs

# Who are most vulnerable and who else is caregiving?

## **Single Parents in Higher Education**

- Single parents more likely to hold some credit but no degree
  - Single mothers, Black, and Indigenous parents
  - Significant intersectional challenges

## **Other Caregivers in Higher Education**

- Young adult caregivers make up between 12% -18%
- Women most often provide care
  - Most caring for female relative, most often grandmother
- LGBTQIA+ community become caregivers at a slightly higher rate
- Only a fraction receive compensation
  - many also work part-time

# Mental Health & Caregiving

#### **Circumstances Impacting Mental Health**

- College student caregivers are managing multiple, complex responsibilities
  - Coursework/expectations
  - Employment
  - Caregiving
- High basic need insecurities
- Inflexible academic/financial aid policies

### **Mental Health Impacts of Caregiving**

- College student caregivers have increased psychiatric distress, including:
  - Depression
  - Struggle with school/work/life balance
  - Higher levels of substance abuse
  - Feelings of isolation and not belonging

Covid-19 exacerbated all these issues!

# Higher Education **Programs** Supporting Student Caregivers

Successful programs for student caregivers provide:

- Financial support / scholarships
- Care for dependents
- Housing
- Social/Emotional/Institutional Support

Additional support offered by institutions:

- Connection to community resources
- Caregiving guidance

# Recommendations to Support Student Caregivers in Colorado

#### Caregiver-friendly Campuses:

- Visibility of student parents on campus and in promotional materials
- Lactation rooms, changing tables, diapers, child-friendly spaces (dining facilities, open space).
- Flexible scheduling: Class times, breaks.
- More Family Housing.
- Dependent care on student health insurance.

#### More Accessible and Affordable Childcare:

- Expand campus day care services extended hours, more spaces, drop-in services, child friendly spaces to rent (ex: for babysitting co-ops).
- Partnerships with local organizations (Ex: Head Start, Child Care Council, Generation Hope) to help with affordability.

#### Create Office Specifically for Caregiver Student Supports:

- Train staff on the unique stressors of student caregivers
- Create codified policies and procedures for students to request formal accommodations
- Advocacy groups and support services (similar to disability services)
- Workshops, counsellors, and support groups for caregiver population (Ex: <u>Ivy Tech</u>)
- Website of resources for caregiver parents (Ex: <u>Hunger Free campus</u> checklist)

# Inclusive Policy Considerations

- Individuals over the age of 65 will double in the next 2 years – There will be more caregivers needed and number of caregivers will increase
- Health Care Access and Affordability Many student healthcare plans don't allow for dependent care
- LGBTQIA+ community is more likely to become caregivers – policy that takes this into consideration
- Care for children with disabilities, health problems, or behavior problems
- Strengthen Scholarship and Grant programs to support 1st generation and caregiving students
- Intersectionality of student caregiver experiences and barriers

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
