The Colorado General Education Credentialing Task Force aims to highlight, reinforce, and apply the value of Colorado higher education institutions' general education program by packaging it into quality academic micro-credentials, including digital micro-credentials. It recognizes that skills gained through Colorado's general education program are directly and broadly applicable and are in increasingly high demand.

General Education Credential Framework

1

Develop a roadmap for Colorado higher education institutions to create and implement GE credentials

2

Facilitate portability and transferability among higher education institutions

3

Highlight the identity and value of Colorado's general education program

4

Provide evidence of attainment of broadly applicable skills and competencies

5

Recognize early career and foundational academic achievements that promote student persistence, retention, and completion

6

Offer additional stackability toward two- and four-year degrees and encourage advanced study of foundational skills
